





A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING VARIOUS BRIDGE IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS IN AND FOR THE COUNTY OF ONONDAGA, NEW YORK, AT A MAXIMUM ESTIMATED COST OF \$880,000, AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$880,000 BONDS OF SAID COUNTY TO PAY COSTS THEREOF

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the total voting strength of the County Legislature of the County of Onondaga, New York, as follows:

<u>Section 1.</u> Various bridge improvement projects, including retaining walls and approaches thereto, as well as incidental costs, are hereby authorized in and for the County of Onondaga, New York, at a maximum estimated cost of \$880,000.

<u>Section 2.</u> The plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$880,000 bonds of said County, hereby authorized to be issued therefor pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

<u>Section 3.</u> It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes is twenty years pursuant to subdivision 10 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

<u>Section 4.</u> The faith and credit of said County of Onondaga, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds becoming due and payable in such year. To the extent not available from other sources, there shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same become due and payable.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Chief Fiscal Officer of such County. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Chief Fiscal Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 6. All other matters except as provided herein relating to the bonds herein authorized including the date, denominations, maturities and interest payment dates, within the limitations prescribed herein and the manner of execution of the same, including the consolidation with other issues, and also the ability to issue bonds with substantially level or declining annual debt service, shall be determined by the Chief Fiscal Officer, the chief fiscal officer of such County. Such bonds shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 51.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Chief Fiscal Officer shall determine consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.



Project Description

This Canalways Trail Extension project (PINS 3950.49 and 3756.29) is proposed to extend along the southern shore of Onondaga Lake beginning at the New York State Fairgrounds (at an existing trailhead) to the Honeywell Visitors Center, then southeasterly across the south shore of the Lake (the Honeywell Cleanup Site); then southeasterly over the CSX Railroad tracks and across private property to be taken (owned by OCIDA) to Hiawatha Boulevard (see Attachment A).

Details specific to each of the three trail segments are as follows (see Attachment A):

- 1) West Shore Trail (PIN 3950.49) County Segment West This trail segment will tie into the existing canalway trail completed under a recent federally funded project (PIN 3753.55), which is located just north of the Orange Lot of the New York State Fairgrounds. The proposed trail will continue east to the proposed NYSDEC Marina and beyond to the Honeywell property line, and will be approximately 10 feet wide with 2-foot graded shoulders on either side. The trail will be constructed of a crushed stone sub-base overlain by asphalt courses. The excavation depth will not exceed 18.5-inches.
- 2) West Shore Trail (PIN 3756.29) Honeywell Segment This trail segment extends easterly from the Honeywell Visitor's Center to Harbor Brook, just west of the CSX Railroad tracks, however a portion of the trail will split into two trail routes; this is needed to accommodate future maintenance operations by Honeywell as part of continuing cleanup efforts. Both routes generally will follow existing construction haul roads presently being used for remediation efforts at Onondaga Lake. Overall, this section of the trail will also be approximately 10 feet wide with 2-foot graded shoulders on either side, constructed of a crushed stone subbase overlain by asphalt courses. The excavation depth will not exceed 18.5-inches.
- 3) West Shore Trail (PIN 3756.29) County Segment East This trail segment begins at Harbor Brook where
 the trail is proposed to ascend to meet a pedestrian bridge structure that will cross over the existing CSX
 Railroad tracks, cross over the property owned by OCIDA to Hiawatha Boulevard. Approaches on the north
 and south sides of the bridge will be constructed using retaining walls with a sloped embankment. The bridge
 abutments will be comprised of piles sunk up to 200 feet below concrete pads approximately four feet deep.
 No excavation is anticipated to exceed a depth of 24-inches.

SEQR Environmental Assessment Form

The proposed action is the construction of a multi-use recreational trail as an extension of the existing West Shore Trail along Onondaga Lake. The project will provide public access along the West Shore of Onondaga Lake for recreational use by extending the existing Onondaga County West Shore Trail. The trail is proposed to be constructed in three segments and all proposed work will be above the ordinary high water mark (OHWM). The potential environmental effects for this project were documented in the Final Design report Canalway Trail Extension Project Pin 3750.49 and Final Design report Canalway Trail Extension Project Phase II Pin 3756.29. The following paragraphs summarize potential impacts identified in Part 2 of the FEAF and further discussed in the final design reports.

Impact on Land -

The project will be completed in phases and take longer than one year, however the overall level of activity will not be substantially different than that of a single phased project.

To mitigate the potential for soil erosion, the Design Reports note that a SPDES General Permit GP-0-15-002 will be required and a Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) with the appropriate sediment and erosion control measures will be developed.

No significant impacts are anticipated.

Impact on Surface Water -

The trail route along Onondaga Lake shoreline will cross the 100-foot Adjacent Area of wetlands created/restored by Honeywell in Wastebeds 1-8 and identified by NYSDEC as State regulated wetlands. The trail may also cross the 100-foot Adjacent Area of NYSDEC Wetland SYW-19. Impacts to these wetlands or their 100-foot buffers will require a permit under Article 24 Freshwater Wetlands. The area of impact will be small and efforts to realign the trail during final design will be evaluated during the permitting process. No significant impacts to these wetlands are anticipated.

Impact on Flooding -

Portions of the proposed project will occur within the 100 year floodplain of Onondaga Lake. Work in the 100-year floodplain will include some fill for the trail, however, no significant loss of flood storage will occur and therefore there will be no significant impact to the floodplain.

Impacts on Plants and Animals -

A habitat assessment of the project area was completed by CHA Consulting Ecology Staff on June 10, 2016 to determine the potential presence of federal and State protected species within or adjacent to the project limits, or the presence of suitable habitat. For all the species identified the in the assessment, including the northern long-eared bat, Indiana bat, eastern Massasauga, lake sturgeon and the straight-leaf pondweed, no significant impacts were identified.

Impact on Historic and Archeological Resources -

The New York State Office of Parks, Recreation, and Historic Preservation has provided correspondence indicating that there will be no impact to cultural resources by this project (attached).
