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# PUBLIC SAFETY COMMITTEE MINUTES – JANUARY 20, 2022 MARK A. OLSON, CHAIRMAN

Chairman Olson called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. A motion was made by Mr. Knapp, seconded by Mr. Ryan to waive the reading of the previous committee meeting. 1. **SHERIFF'S:** William Bleyle, Chief Deputy

a. **BOND:** A Resolution Authorizing Replacement of Radios for the Sheriff's Department in and for the County of Onondaga, New York, at a Maximum Estimated Cost of \$4,665,000, and Authorizing the Issuance of \$4,665,000 Bonds of Said County to Pay Costs Thereof (\$4,665,000)

# Mr. Bleyle:

- Thank you for your time representing the Sheriff's office to present a bonding resolution of \$4.665m for replacement of the Sheriff's radio system in 2009 Onondaga County ("OC") invested \$35m for radios for Sheriffs and all public safety this was bonded for 10 years which was the service life of the system those are now 13 years old no longer serviceable back in 2013 vendor said parts would be scarce chips and other components don't have a long shelf life struggled through from 2013 to now no longer service radios as of 2020 many key component parts are no longer available
- Continuing to see radio failures to include chip component failure and inability to hold memory—starting to see the ports wear portable radios that you see in the field wear and tear makes it hard to reprogram new 21 deputies in the academy and only had 11 radios NYS contract prices and total represents a 1 for 1 replacement look at replacing in two phases starting in 2022 new radios cost of \$3.5m which includes programming and speaker microphones phase two in 2023 to purchase mobile units for \$1.55m will include replacement of car radios will be a few old radios that will continue be used could sell and obtain some money for the old unused radios could repurpose to other OC agencies old radios were a big success and saw few complaints biggest issue is price older units could be repurposed to volunteer fire departments

## Mr. Knapp:

• What's the procurement process going to look like – Mr. Bleyle answered they will sit with purchasing – think OC could do better than the State contract with a large purchase putting mobile and car radios on the table – Mr. Knapp asked how does evaluation work – Mr. Bleyle answered would look hard to see where we want to go with hardware – problem with radio systems today is they install a number of proprietary features – want to sell you their brand – upside is that federal government said these need to operate on any system – put out a list of factors that all vendors have to meet – if disaster all radios would

be able to work – there are soft failures – how a brand fails is different which is not a factor in federal requirements – some still are able to function with a failure – if a new feature comes out for instance GPS for portables – vendors have differences in how they work – go sole source or open for competitive bidding

## Mr. Bleyle:

- Answered Mr. Ryan's question regarding bidding procurement has not put out a bid prices are from State contracting portables looking at 700 and mobile 192 mobile for a vehicle is much different for boat and aircraft same for portables drug unit uses different frequencies so would need dual band SWAT teams uses headsets all of these factors play into pricing
- Answered Mr. Ryan's question is there discussion on looking at this beyond the sheriff's department not sure if city has been replacing
- Confirmed that there was a county wide purchase of radios all on same platform and equipment
- Was involved in planning well before 2009 recollection was that OC bid the system of the \$35m total in order to make it happen to include all agencies towns and village police, WEP, state agreement was that all equipment was purchased together but departments were responsible for all replacements one thing that could happen is to open up bidding for other departments
- Jefferson County built into this radio system fairly recently so if they wanted to utilize the pricing of Jefferson County they could do that- OC could open this up to fire departments and any other counties

#### Mr. Olson:

• Fayetteville is going through this and received a \$543k grant – timing is very difficult because of labor and supply shortage – Fayetteville, Manlius, Minoa and Kirkville had to pay 5% of the total - grants available and people need to look for grants

# Mr. Ryan:

• Repair is a big component – some radios get repaired outside of the county

#### Mr. Blevle:

• Back in 2009 there was an extended warranty – now the units are less radio and more like a computer – repairs have been low – used to have a repair contract which was essential – models currently used are very rugged – few components as they are basically one big chip – so maintenance is substantially reduced – could ask for two year warranty – local shops don't have parts or propriety information – antennas can be replaced and cracked case – costs of equipment to do anything more is prohibitive – local shop which handles a lot of radios still can't handle this – can only do cosmetics – antenna, cases, volume control, screen – the new stuff has multi-layer surface boards

#### Mr. Garland:

• State contract pricing – you may be able to make that better – please elaborate

# Mr. Bleyle:

• State contract pricing is set for knowing they are going to sell a lot throughout the State but still sold in small numbers like fire departments – if you're dealing with larger numbers they should do better just on volume

# Mr. Garland:

• Are you applying for any state grants – Mr. Bleyle answered been looking for state grants and haven't found any that would make

## Mr. Olson:

• If you could do phase 1 and 2 at the same time that would help with supply chain backlog and pricing increases

• Is there a reason why the Sheriff department hasn't started a reserve fund on a yearly basis

# Mr. Bleyle:

• You would pay more over the 10 year period – technology is changing so rapidly – software being replaced every two years – as radios evolve so does software – it could be problematic because you have different ages of radios – if you have different versions of same radios then you have different vendors to install and upgrade – merit to doing a bulk purchase – not cheap radios at about \$4k per radio – run the risk of changing charging stations – price includes all new chargers – current line of chargers aren't compatible with design changes

## Mr. Olson:

• We received mobiles but can't get stationary and struggling to get vendors to program

# Mr. Knapp:

• 75%-80% of repairs are cosmetic and it would be a shame if these repairs were sent outside of the County

A motion was made by Mr. Ryan, seconded by Mr. Knapp, to adjourn the meeting. Passed unanimously; MOTION CARRIED.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:35 a.m.
