TALKING POINTS FOR ONONDAGA COUNTY LEGISLATIVE SESSION-PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD-AUGUST 2, 2022, FROM BARBARA KAMERANCE

- I was a Special Education teacher and supervisor for a total of 43 years. I saw first-hand the effects of lead poisoning in children causing learning disabilities. These students were often labeled as "lead disabled".
- 2. Last week, Mayor Walsh stated that the cost of replacing lead pipes in Syracuse would be \$100 million. The \$85 million surplus available would pay for 85% of the cost.
- 3. The remainder of the cost would be available through federal monies through the infrastructure funding. Senator Gillibrand spoke last week about money being available.

I can think of 3 reasons right off the top of my head as to why the proposed aquarium should not be built: 1) crime 2) poverty 3) infrastructure

There is widespread knowledge and agreement in the construction industry that a structure needs a firm foundation before anything built on top of it be considered stable. Our city is crumbling. Every day we wake up to news of more lives lost or changed due to violence. I walk in neighborhoods and on city streets to and see litter strewn everywhere? Poverty is rampant, with Syracuse holding the distinction of the highest rate of child poverty ,48.4%, of cities in similar size, in the nation! One of every three

citizens in Syracuse live below the poverty level! There are many concrete ways that 85 million dollars could be spent that would help build a firm foundation in our city. Let's find some real solutions to the problems I mentioned. We know that there are jobs coming to the Syracuse area, some in outlying areas. What good do these jobs do to the residents of Syracuse who lack transportation to these areas? What about funding a reliable public transportation system to help our neighbors take advantage of an opportunity to lift themselves out of the cycle of poverty? This is just one suggestion. I am sure there are many more. Let's listen to each other.

Finally, I don't think the lack of tourism dollars being spent here needs to be our first concern, when crime, poverty and a crumblin frastructure are the visible scars on our landscape.

Dear County Executive Ryan McMahon,

Our community is in need of funds for housing, for mental and physical healthcare, childcare and social services, and to adequately address the lead crisis affecting young children and their families.

According to the best estimate, each year - more than six-hundred children in our county are poisoned by exposure to toxic lead, primarily from paint in their homes. The poisoning is irreversible. The majority of those affected are living in segregated poverty in Syracuse. We have been told there is not enough funding to fully address this decades-old crisis. Those who speak out about the problem face eviction, and the lead ordinance has yet to be properly enforced due in part to the lack of appropriate allocation of County funds.

Imagine what \$85,000,000 (equivalent to 2 ½ times the local dollars to the health department and 3 times the local dollars for children and family services) could do, if properly allocated, to meet community needs for childcare, mental health services and for improving our housing and infrastructure. There is also an urgent need to provide adequate staffing and funding for the Onondaga County Health Department, and for solving the lead poisoning crisis once and for all. We join with community organizations, <u>experts in public health</u>, <u>CNY faith leaders</u>, <u>over 1000 petitioners</u>, and many more community members that are voicing their concern about the use of funds and yet the avenues available to provide input are far from ideal. We insist upon increased community input, and transparency.

The community must be heard on this issue. Our families need relief.

Hi all,

My name is Sargunvir Sondhi and I am a current medical student at SUNY Upstate Medical University. I want to thank you for allowing me to speak in front of you today in opposition to the \$85,000,000 aquarium project, which, to me, represents a radical inappropriate allocation of funds. The primary reason cited for this project is to boost our local economy by bringing in outside revenue via top-down or "trickle-down economics." As illustrated throughout the 20th century and various studies in current literature, this type of policy initiative tends to benefit the top economic classes, while disenfranchising our most vulnerable populations. Instead, what I want to advocate for is bottom-up economics, in which we empower our local community members to build up our community.

For example, recently, Legislator Charles Garland promised to vote yes to the aquarium if \$4.5 million for new housing was offered. And indeed, county executive Ryan McMahon freed up \$3.7 million to fight lead poisoning and promised to support a \$1 million façade improvement program. But, I believe this "trade" does not go far enough.

Syracuse has one of the highest child poverty rates in the nation, and, last year, for the first time in 6 years, had an increase in children diagnosed with lead poisoning. If our community's children, which hold the key to our community's future, cannot thrive and have basic necessities, they will not be able to reach their full potential. This holds true in light of several sociological and psychological models, such as Maslow's hierarchy of needs and the socioecological model.

So here, I stand to make my plea for a better allocation of funds. I don't believe our community needs an aquarium, as much as the empowerment of our constituents. Instead, I believe we need aggressive models to provide affordable housing, expand the Onondaga County Health and Social Services Department, and improve our local infrastructure.

I thank you for your time and hope you will make the decision that will best serve our community.

What is the future we want and how can we create it?

Simply put, we want a healthier, safer, more humane life for everyone.

How can we create it?

Let's begin by helping residents struggling with health and economic hardships. And let's also help tens of thousands of low-income neighbors who share their lives with their pets.

Sadly, Onondaga County is a huge pet resource desert if you don't have extra money.

We urge the legislature to set aside 1% of the county's surplus funds - a very modest portion - to provide low-cost, sustainable wellness services, including spay and neuter, for the pets of low-income residents.

Some folks' eyes glaze over at the word "pets." But for many struggling families, their pets are a necessity. Not true, commented a fellow citizen recently to Fixing to Help: Pets could never be considered a necessity!

Fixing to Help replied that for residents who are without a large network of family or friends, or who are struggling to make ends meet, or are coping with illness or a housing crisis, or are alone or afraid – for them, pets may be their lifeline.

I repeat, pets can be a lifeline.

They can give us a reason to get up each day and to feel connected to life. We've seen it ... Researchers affirmed it ... We feel it ourselves.

Pets teach children kindness and selflessness. They help them learn the value of life itself. We've all seen how animals can touch a spot in a child's heart that we cannot reach.

No child, or adult, should ever have to watch their beloved pet suffer or die because basic health care was not available.

We do NOT accept that an aquarium filled with captive animals can begin to touch the human needs in our community.

Instead, we respectfully urge allocating funding to human services, some of which help our good neighbors help their pets.

Good afternoon. My name is Oceanna Fair. I am a Southside homeowner, formerly a renter, and South Branch Leader of Families for Lead Freedom Now!

As I have noted elsewhere, childhood lead poisoning in my family has become generational. My brother was lead poisoned as a toddler. He is now in his 40s and relies on his siblings for his most basic care. A few years ago, my granddaughter was lead poisoned in the home that my husband and I were renting.

Our landlord failed to inform us, as the law requires, of lead hazards, and failed to remediate his house. This should not have been the case. One of the ways to prevent such tragic suffering from visiting more families is by prioritizing the use of our surplus resources. Today, let me bring your attention to two ways to prioritize greater investment:

The resourcing of new contractors to conduct home remediation work that is funded by the Department of Housing and Urban Development, and,

Oversight of the HUD-funded contractors' work so that all contractors perform a complete and safe remediation project.

We have heard from reliable sources that it takes far too much up-front capital to resource a HUDremediation project to allow small contractors, including minority contractors, to contract for the work. This prevents the county from quickly disbursing all available HUD funds to make our housing safer. We propose creating a capital fund that small contractors can access so we have more contractors engaged in urgent remediation work.

Additionally, we have heard that the work currently being done has left some families with new lead hazards, instead of the safe space that remediation work should provide. At this time, we believe these outcomes are a result of poor oversight of compliance with HUD safety standards. We believe these concerns need to be addressed, perhaps through the development of a new oversight protocol.

In fact, my home is an example. When my home was remediated in 2021 with a HUD grant, the porch floor was allowed to be painted in the dead of winter, which is not acceptable for remediation. Yet, the County inspector signed off on this work, and paid the contractor. To this day, the County has yet to make whole on its promise to me to address this lead hazard that their own contractor left behind.

We believe the County can and should produce a balanced allocation of surplus resources. We need to get it right. Success will come by allocating available monies and attention to solving the problems, such as lead poisoning, that have become crises for far too many Onondaga County residents. Thank you.

Lead poisoning in Syracuse children:

- Syracuse has a major lead poisoning problem. In Flint, MI the 3.2% of children tested had lead poisoning.ⁱ In Syracuse 10.5% (n=396) of children who were tested had lead poisoning in 2021.ⁱⁱ
- In Onondaga County outside of Syracuse, 0.8% of children have lead poisoning.
- Lead poisoning is higher among Children of Color in Syracuse: 11.5% of African America children, vs 6.4% of White children had lead poisoning in 2020,ⁱⁱⁱ among those tested.

Impact of lead poisoning in Syracuse children

• In 2018-2019, 78% of Syracuse public school 3rd graders failed to read at grade level on year-end standardized tests.

Lead poisoning can lead to risk-taking behavior—Including violence and arrest in adolescence

- A Cincinnati study found that for every 5mcg/dl of lead, there is between a 27%-40% increase in arrests in adolescence.^{iv}
- In 2021, Syracuse had 32 murders, many of those committed by adolescents and young adults. $^{\nu}$
- The Syracuse Police have documented about 325 gunshot episodes per year.
- In 2021-- 135 people were injured by gunshots but not killed.
- In 2021—32 people were murdered by guns

Let's follow the money

- In 2008, our research demonstrated that the consequences of lead poisoning cost the county at least \$500,000 annually in elevated Medicaid, teen pregnancy, criminal justice, and special education costs. Lack of meaningful action on lead poisoning in Onondaga County during the 14 years since we published this estimate means that the county has spent at least \$14M responding to the consequences of lead poisoning.
- Our research also demonstrated that the cost to cover the emergency care of gunshot injuries in Syracuse totals nearly \$4 million dollars per year.
- In 2021 there were 135 individuals injured by gunshots who were not killed.^{vi} --totaling \$3,848,850 (assuming a cost of \$28,585^{vii} per injury for the ED costs alone).

The Onondaga County Conservative Party request that the following message is read into the record:

"In this time of economic upheaval that has most people scrambling to pay critical living expenses, we find it disingenuous that Onondaga County continues to push the construction of a non-essential aquarium in hopes of bringing in a few tourism dollars.

We believe the aquarium project shows a clear disconnect and indifference within our elected officials.

One does not 'fix the porch' when the house is burning.

The Conservative Party strongly recommends shelving the project."

I feel that an aquarium would create a needless financial burden on taxpayers when ongoing staffing and maintenance costs are factored in.

If the aquarium is a solid economic venture, the private sector should consider the project.

Further, it is important that you recognize that both the Conservative Party and most of the Democratic legislators stand together against the aquarium.

Jaime Howley, retired LMSW, worked occupational health, a Community Activist living on the Southside for 17 years and was the co-founder of the Get the Lead Out Block Party and the Syracuse Tenants Union

I am going to ignore the aquarium because they have turned ther backs on the lead poisoned children and families in Onondaga county. But things that are ignored, do not go away. Often they come back to haunt you.

Every child is priceless. Including those with Childhood Lead Poisoning. When a child is born our hopes for them are enormous. But Lead in their homes, unseen in dust, enters our young children and robs them of their futures. It also robs their parents of all their hopes and dreams for their child. Because lead is a powerful neurotoxin, the brain damage it creates will follow them ALL THE DAYS of their lives. In school they have trouble lerarning, trouble holding a pencil, trouble learning to write, trouble sitting still and following instructions. Lead poisoned children will misbehave in class and disrupt the class because they have difficulty following the classroom rules, they speak out of turn, have poor impulse control and poor decision making skills. These problems will follow them from one class to the next. Our schools test scores are lower because of the lead in our children. Many will drop out of school. Not graduate from high school. They will likely require special services all through school. Special services are expensive.

WE KNOW WHAT MUST BE DONE TO PROTECT OUR CHILDREN FROM LEAD! GET THE LEAD OUT OF HOUSING! MAKE ALL HOUSING LEAD SAFE FOR ALL OUR CHILDREN. AND THEY ARE ALL OUR CHILDREN, EVEN THOSE LIVING IN THE POISONED HOMES!

Boys are more likely to become involved in crime, gangs and the criminal justice system. It is more costly to incarcerate someone than to send them to college. Criminal Justice in includes the police, courts and the prison system. That is very very expensive. And no one wants their child to go to Jail.

WE KNOW WHAT TO DO !! JUST DO IT! DO IN NOW!

The term "lead exposure" is misleading. Exposure to lead is is plural. No one has a singular exposure. Lead is all around us. In our homes and on our homes. Lead is in the air and the water and the soil. Going under Route 81, look up you are seeing lead degraded paint falling down on traffic. Lead is in the solder on copper pipes, in glazes on dishes, jewelry, toys and so on. Lead is all around.

Do you know that young children absorb 50% of the lead they are exposed to? Lead poisoning is cumulative. And every exposure hurts.

Lead is the end product of radioactive decay. It starts out as a radioactive element. So it should be no surprise that the end product remains toxic. Lead paint that is poorly maintained breaks down into lead dust that lands everywhere and poisons the homes and the children.

Has anyone moved into an apartment that has windows painted shut? My husband took a screw driver and hammer. I think he did it at every place we ever lived. And then he put a fan in the window and blew the dust all over. Home renovations and additions disturb painted surfaces and do-it-yourselfers never consider the lead. When contractors put on additions they disturb painted surfaces containing lead and contaminate the environment. So children in the county can have lead poisoning too. Unlike our country cousins, inner city children's parents often do not own where they live and so do not control their home environment. Landlords and maintenance companies move slowly if at all. Lead in dust is invisible. "What the eye can not see the mind cannot know." Repairs are slow coming often they do not address lead at all.

How is the new lead ordinance working? Are houses being tested? Are repairs being made? Are children's risk of being lead poisoned decreasing?

Addressing the high number of houses in Syracuse is an expensive task. This extra unexpected money could be used to make a difference. It is an opportunity that may never come again. Every child's life is priceless far beyond cost. Lead is a powerful Neurotoxin. There has been a shift to describe the problem as 'lead exposure'. Lead exposure is very rarely a singular event. Exposure includes lead paint dust inside the home, lead dust from decaying paint on the exterior, and in the soil from the paint, but also left over from the years cars ran on leaded gas to stop engine knocking, in water from lead pipes, and on glazes on pottery, painted toys, jewelry, and so on. There are in fact multiple exposures. Daily exposures.

Children are born unfinished. Their brains and entire bodies continue growing until they are adults. Young children absorb 50% of the lead they are exposed to. Childhood lead poisoning is the result of cumulative exposures to every source a child encounters. There is no safe level of lead exposure for young children. The dust is everywhere in and outside the house, in the soil and sometimes in the water. Wasn't there a Robert Frost poem about "eating a peck of dust"? That line should be changed to a 'speck' of dust. A peck of lead dust could kill you.

Removing the lead from our housing, making all housing safe will eventually save money. The cost of Childhood Lead Poisoning is too high to keep paying.

Thank you for putting our children before an Aquarium. All children's lives matter.







Ryan McMahon doesn't think these issues are important enough to address, instead he wants to risk taxpayer money to build an aquarium. It is our county legislature's job to be the checks and balances, we are counting on you to vote no as this proposal does not have enough details, does not factor in the pandemic or our current economy.

We have been through this time and time again, we built the amphitheater but that is not enough, tax breaks to a mall that is failing, tax breaks to billionaires but no infrastructure to get to these places you are building. How does this make sense?

The "feasibility study" states that a small scale aquarium would not draw enough tourists and a large aquarium would cost too much to succeed. First, the Onondaga Nation does not support an aquarium being built on their ancestral lands.

Second, Onondaga County and Syracuse have many needs that \$85 million could start to address. An aquarium is not one of those needs. Some of our most pressing needs include addressing the lead poisoning of our county's children. We need to take serious, sustained action on this preventable poisoning. Effects of lead poisonong are not reversible; families will be strugging to manage the effects and to support their poisoned family members throughout the poisoned relative's lifetime. And each year over 600 additional children in our county are poisoned by lead. We must address our lead poisoning problem before we can consider spending funds on an aquarium.

Third, we need more investment in health, education, and social services in Onondaga County. These investments will help many residents and have a great potential to improve their life outcomes. An aquarium would not achieve that.

Fourth, the study and business model predicting 1342 visitors to the aquarium every day in one of the most impoverished cities in the United States seems overly optimistic. In fact, several descriptions in the study seem to overstate what is possible and likely to happen (example).

Please help our community thrive by helping residents of our county be healthier and get the services they need. Please invest money to stop the lead poisoning that has been going on for decades and could be prevented.

The process by which the aquarium has come to this point is alarming. A taxpayerfunded expenditure of this magnitude has been bulldozed through to a vote without the opportunity for serious public input...open forums with proponents...a referendum.

Our legislators are entrusted to make wise decisions about enterprising options that will build our economy. I expect them to embrace small- to medium-risk ventures after proper consideration and reasonable input from the public.

The aquarium project, by many expert accounts, is more than a medium-risk project. It fails to have widespread public support. Yet it will use taxpayer dollars to come to fruition.

I add my support to those who ask for those \$85M to be used for underfunded human and infrastructure purposes. I also request that 1% of the \$200M budget surplus be set aside specifically for the development of a system of low-cost, sustainable wellness services for pets of low-income county residents.

The reality is that many tens of thousands of low-income residents are negatively impacted because they live in a pet resource desert. Many would much rather live with cracked windows, peeling floors, and leaking faucets if it meant they could take care of their pets' most basic health needs.

Right now, low-income pet owners have no way to provide vet care. So instead, they agonize as their watch their pets suffer through easily treatable illnesses or die without so much as a way to provide pain relief or humane euthanasia.

Helping people's pets ends up being a human service that reaches deep into thousands of county homes.

In response to the proposed plan to build an \$85M aquarium, please vote No.

The fact that County Executive McMahon wants to use COVID relief money for such a project is irresponsible and not doing what is best for the city of Syracuse. As you know, Syracuse has one of the highest poverty rates in the country - at 30% it is double the national average. Couple that with the fact that Syracuse was just voted #1 in child poverty and using \$85M to build a non-essential aquarium is just idiotic, to put it mildly.

Aquariums are not tourist attractions. People do not travel to aquariums as their primary vacation destination. People don't travel *TO* Boston because of the aquarium - they visit the aquarium *BECAUSE* they are in a huge tourist-attracting city and they got discount coupons with a Whale Tour. AMENDING THE RULES OF THE ONONDAGA COUNTY LEGISLATURE

WHEREAS, it is the desire of this Legislature to amend the Rules of the Onondaga County Legislature to use gender-neutral and inclusive language, clarify intent, and better align the Rules with the Onondaga County Charter; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that Rule 2 of the Rules of the Onondaga County Legislature is hereby amended to read as follows:

RULE 2. Special Sessions of the County Legislature shall, upon filing with the Clerk of a request therefore, be initiated by: A. the Chairperson, Majority Leader and Minority Leader, or B. a majority of all the members of the Legislature; to be called by the Clerk of the County Legislature by emailing each member at least three (3) days before the date of such session a written notice thereof stating the date, time, and purpose of such session. Special Sessions of the County Legislature shall, upon filing with the Clerk of a request therefore, also be initiated by: C. two-thirds of all of the members of the Legislature to be called by the Clerk of the County Legislature by emailing each member before the time of such session conveying the date, time, and purpose of such special session pursuant to the Open Meetings Law. A member may waive the service of notice for a special session by a writing signed by the member.

and, be it further

RESOLVED, that Rule 3 of the Rules of the Onondaga County Legislature is hereby amended to read as follows:

RULE 3. The Order of business at each day's Session, except at such times as may be set apart for the consideration of special orders of the day, shall be as follows:

- 1. Calling the roll of members by the Clerk.
- 2. Reading and approval of the minutes of the proceedings of the previous session.
- Presentation of Communications.
 a. Chairperson's Remarks.
 b. Dublic Community

b. Public Comment.

- 4. Reports of Standing Committees.
- 5. Reports of Special Committees.
- 6. Calling the respective legislative districts for the presentation of petitions and resolutions. Provided, however, that the Clerk shall rotate on a monthly basis the order of calling the respective legislative districts for the presentation of resolutions and petitions by calling a different district each month to be the first and last to present resolutions and petitions, commencing in the first month of the term by calling district one first and district seventeen last, and proceeding consecutively each month to call successive districts first and last.

No petition or resolution shall be received unless it shall have first been considered by a standing, special, or sub-committee of this Legislature. No petition or resolution shall be received except under this call unless consented to by a majority vote.

- 8. Introduction of Local Laws or Ordinances. (*Note: Need not go through committee*)
- 9. Unfinished Business.

- 10. Announcements from the Chair.
- 11. Adjournment.

and, be it further

RESOLVED, that Rule 8 of the Rules of the Onondaga County Legislature is hereby amended to read as follows:

All petitions, resolutions, local laws, ordinances and reports of Committees and RULE 8. communications shall be in writing and read by the Clerk of the County Legislature or by a person designated by the Clerk, and shall be filed with the Clerk of the County Legislature not later than 11:00 a.m. of the Monday of the week preceding any regular meeting, and 11:00 a.m. three (3) days preceding any special meeting, or adjourned meeting. Amendments of the foregoing shall be presented to the County Legislature not later than 11:00 a.m. on the day of any regular, special, or adjourned meeting. The provisions of the foregoing in reference to filing of petitions, resolutions, local laws, ordinances, amendments thereto, reports of Committees and communications, may be waived by a majority vote of the County Legislature members present and voting. All petitions, resolutions, local law, ordinances and amendments thereto will be provided to the County Attorney, or outside counsel pursuant to the County Charter, for review and approval as to form and legality. Nothing contained herein shall prohibit the Chairperson of the County Legislature, upon a finding by the Chairperson that a conflict of interest may be present or that it is in the best interest of the County Legislature, from using outside counsel or a specifically designated Legislative Counsel to provide legal assistance, including, but not limited to, the preparation of resolutions, ordinances, legalizing acts and local laws to be presented for action by the County Legislature. Such outside counsel or specifically designated Legislative Counsel may, but are not required to, seek the advice of the County Attorney as to form and legality in the preparation of resolutions, ordinances, legalizing acts and local laws.

and, be it further

RESOLVED, that Rule 10 of the Rules of the Onondaga County Legislature is hereby amended to read as follows:

RULE 10. All resolutions, ordinances and local laws, whether or not previously referred to an appropriate committee, may, when tabled pursuant to Rule 9, be referred to such appropriate Committee without debate, unless waived by a majority of the County Legislature members present and voting. The Committee Chair may request an opinion from the County Attorney, or outside counsel pursuant to the County Charter, on the legality of the proposed legislation prior to consideration by the Committee.

and, be it further

RESOLVED, that Rule 11 of the Rules of the Onondaga County Legislature is hereby amended to read as follows:

RULE 11. When a question shall be under consideration, no motion shall be received except as herein specified, which motion shall have precedence in the order named, to wit:

- 1. For an adjournment or recess of the County Legislature.
- 2. A call of the County Legislature.
- 3. For the previous question.
- 4. To lay on the table.
- 5. To postpone indefinitely.

- 6. To postpone to a certain day.
- 7. To go into a committee of the whole on pending subject immediately.
- 8. To refer to a committee of the whole.
- 9. To refer to a standing committee.
- 10. To refer to a special committee.
- 11. To amend.

All motions for an adjournment or recess, for the previous question, or to lay on the table, shall neither be amended nor debatable.

No motion shall be made, except a motion to adjourn or recess, and no votes shall be taken except a vote to adjourn or recess, between the hours of midnight and 8:00 a.m.

RESOLVED, that Rule 15 of the Rules of the Onondaga County Legislature is hereby amended to read as follows:

RULE 15. No motion for reconsideration shall be in order unless made on the same day, or the meeting day next succeeding that on which the decision proposed to be reconsidered took place. A motion to reconsider must be made by a member who voted with the majority on the decision of the motion or resolution proposed to be reconsidered. When a motion to reconsider has been decided, it shall not again be submitted within the same term of the current Legislature. A twice defeated resolution cannot be reoffered for a period of six months, unless the majority of the members of the proper committee shall recommend the reoffering of said resolution. The committee Chair may request an opinion from the County Attorney, or outside counsel pursuant to the County Charter, on the similarity and legality of the proposed legislation prior to the consideration thereof by the proper committee.

and, be it further

RESOLVED, that Rule 16 of the Rules of the Onondaga County Legislature is hereby amended to read as follows:

RULE 16. In case the Chairperson is to be absent for not more than one (1) day at a time, the Chairperson may appoint a member of the County Legislature to be acting Chairperson. If the Chairperson shall be absent for a longer time, the County Legislature shall elect a temporary Chairperson, and if at any time no presiding officer shall be present, the County Legislature may elect a temporary Chairperson. In addition to the foregoing, at the commencement of each Session there shall be a period of up to thirty (30) minutes during which members of the public may address the Legislature on any items on the Session Agenda and on any issues germane to the business of the Legislature as determined by the Chairperson. Persons so addressing the Legislature may speak for a maximum of five (5) minutes. These time limits may be waived by the Chairperson. Those persons desiring to address the Legislature must make application to the Clerk of the Legislature prior to the commencement of Session.

RESOLVED, that Rule 30 of the Rules of the Onondaga County Legislature is hereby amended to read as follows:

RULE 30. Oral motions shall be put to vote with a second in regard to resolutions, local laws, ordinances, and amendments (all other oral motions shall not require a second, and a vote would be taken following the Rules of this County Legislature or Robert's Rules of Order), and written motions on resolutions shall be put to vote without being seconded, and if there be no objection to the motions and resolutions when read, they shall be adopted with a roll call to be taken in one of the following manners decided by the Chairperson: (a) the Clerk shall call the name of each County Legislator present; (b) the Clerk shall call the name of the County Legislator whose surname shall be first alphabetically, then the Majority Leader, the Minority Leader, and the County Legislator whose surname shall be last alphabetically.

In every instance, the Floor Leaders shall be called to cast the first and second vote, rotating monthly which Floor Leader shall cast the first and which Floor Leader shall cast the second vote, and the Chairperson shall be called to cast the last vote.

and, be it further

RESOLVED, that Rule 33 of the Rules of the Onondaga County Legislature is hereby amended to read as follows:

RULE 33. Every member who shall be in the room when a question is stated by the chair, shall vote thereon, unless excused with the consent of at least two-thirds of the members present, or unless if a member be personally interested in the question in which case the member may, upon request, be excused by the Chairperson from voting.

As the name of each legislator is called, the legislator shall, unless excused from the vote, respond by voting "aye", "yes", or "no" and no other response shall be permitted.

and, be it further

RESOLVED, that Rule 37 of the Rules of the Onondaga County Legislature is hereby amended to read as follows:

RULE 37. The following Standing Committees, including the committee Chair, Vice Chair and members, shall be appointed by the permanent Chairperson within twenty (20) days after the Chairperson's election, and a list of such Committees shall forthwith be filed with the Clerk of the County Legislature. There shall be five (5) members on the Standing Committees and seven (7) members on the Ways and Means Committee.

RESOLVED, that Rule 38 of the Rules of the Onondaga County Legislature is hereby amended to read as follows:

RULE 38. The committees so appointed by the Chairperson shall have general and supervisory charge of all matters pertaining to the operation of the respective departments of the County Government over which they have supervision. It shall be the duty of each member of the Committees to become familiar with the work of departments or agencies of County Government entrusted to each of such committee. Each such Committee by majority vote shall have the power to subpoen witnesses and to investigate in such manner as seems best, the particular department or agency of County Government under its supervision and to that end may, if occasion demand, take sworn statements from any county employees of the County on any matter affecting the proper, economical and lawful operation of the department under investigation.

RULE 51. The Organizational Meeting of the Onondaga County Legislature shall convene within the first day, other than a Saturday, Sunday or a holiday, in the month of January of the calendar year next succeeding the General Election at which the Legislators have been elected to the County Legislature, and shall at that meeting elect a Chairperson and Clerks for the term of office for which the members of the County Legislature were elected. Provided, however, that Organizational Meeting may be convened within the first three days, other than a Saturday, Sunday or holiday, in the month of January when so designated in writing by the Chairperson of the County Legislature. A written notice of the date and time of the organization meeting shall be given to each Legislator by the Clerk of the County Legislature at least four days prior to said meeting. Thereafter, the County Legislature shall operate under the Rules of the previous Legislature until such times as new rules are adopted by the Legislative body.

and, be it further

RESOLVED, that Rule 52 of the Rules of the Onondaga County Legislature is hereby amended to read as follows:

RULE 52. Procedure for organization meeting: The Clerk of the County Legislature last elected shall act as Chair pro tem. The Chair pro tem shall call the County Legislature to order and call the roll, followed by a pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Whereupon the Chair pro tem shall declare: "The first order of business is the election of the Chairperson". Nominations for the office of Chairperson shall then be taken from the floor and such nominations must be seconded. Before proceeding to an election, the Chair pro tem shall inquire if there are any further nominations. If there is no response, the Chair pro tem shall declare the nominations closed. Voting shall be by full roll call with each legislator, when the legislator's name is called, declaring the name of the candidate of the legislator's choice who has been duly nominated and seconded. Voting shall

continue until a candidate receives a majority vote of the whole number of members of the County Legislature; whereupon the Chair pro tem shall declare the duly elected Chairperson. Upon election, the Chairperson shall immediately assume all duties and responsibilities of the office and shall continue to act in such capacity until the termination of office.

The Chairperson shall then preside over the election of the Clerk, Deputy Clerk and Assistant Clerk of the County Legislature subject to the same procedure and vote. Upon election, the Clerks shall immediately assume all duties and responsibilities of the office of the County Legislature.

SECTION 1.

A. MEETINGS.

Res. 2 - 1.5.21

RULE 1. Regular Sessions of the County Legislature shall be held on the first Tuesday of each month at 1:00 p.m. except when such Tuesday shall fall on the Legal Holiday, in which case the Session shall be held on the next following business day, or when such Tuesday is Election Day, the Session shall be held on the Thursday following. The date or time of a regular Session may be changed in the same manner as the scheduling of a special session pursuant to Rule 2, or by a motion duly passed by a majority of the whole number of the County Legislature. Each regular session and all adjourned regular sessions shall be open for the consideration of any matter which may properly be brought to the attention of the County Legislature.

RULE 2. Special Sessions of the County Legislature shall, upon filing with the Clerk of a request therefore, be initiated by: **A.** the Chairperson, Majority Leader and Minority Leader, or **B.** a majority of all the members of the Legislature; to be called by the Clerk of the County Legislature by emailing each member at least three (3) days before the date of such session a written notice thereof stating the date, time, and purpose of such session. Special Sessions of the County Legislature by: **C.** two-thirds of all of the members of the Legislature to be called by the Clerk of the County Legislature by: **C.** two-thirds of all of the members of the Legislature to be called by the Clerk of the County Legislature by emailing each member before the time of such session conveying the date, time, and purpose of such session pursuant to Open Meetings Law. A member may waive the service of notice for a special session by a writing signed by the member.

Res. 43 - 3.12.98 RULE 3. The Order of business at each day's Session, except at such times as may be set apart for the consideration of special orders of the day, shall be as follows:

- 1. Calling the roll of members by the Clerk.
- 2. Reading and approval of the minutes of the proceedings of the previous session.
- Presentation of Communications.
 a. Chairperson's Remarks.
 b. Public Comment.
- 4. Reports of Standing Committees.
- 5. Reports of Special Committees.
- 6. Calling the respective legislative districts for the presentation of petitions and resolutions. Provided, however, that the Clerk shall rotate on a monthly basis the order of calling the respective legislative districts for the presentation of resolutions and petitions by calling a different district each month to be the first and last to present resolutions and petitions, commencing in the first month of the term by calling district one first and district seventeen last, and proceeding consecutively each month to call successive districts first and last.

No petition or resolution shall be received unless it shall have first been considered by a standing, special, or sub-committee of this Legislature. No petition or resolution shall be received except under this call unless consented to by a majority vote.

- 8. Introduction of Local Laws or Ordinances. (*Note: Need not go through committee*)
- 9. Unfinished Business.
- 10. Announcements from the Chair.
- 11. Adjournment.

RULE 4. On roll call, the Clerk shall record by names all members present or absent.

RULE 5. The majority of the whole number of the County Legislature as defined in Section 105-i of the Charter shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but a lesser number may adjourn.

B. LEGISLATION.

Res. 215 - 9.3.91 **RULE 6.** The title to all resolutions, local laws and ordinances shall state concisely the subject matter of all such legislation. All resolutions, local laws, and ordinances shall be introduced only by a member of the County Legislature. The name of the Legislative sponsor of a local law shall be designated on the session agenda and on a cover sheet to such local law distributed in accordance with Section 20 of the Municipal Home Rule Law.

RULE 7. No resolution, local law or ordinance shall be introduced in the County Legislature except in one of the following modes:

- 1. Under the order of introduction of resolutions, local laws or ordinances.
- 2. By majority consent.
- 3. By report of committee.

Res. 49 - 5.1.18 **RULE 8.** All petitions, resolutions, local laws, ordinances and reports of Committees and communications shall be in writing and read by the Clerk of the County Legislature or by a person designated by the Clerk, and shall be filed with the Clerk of the County Legislature not later than 11:00 a.m. of the Monday of the week preceding any regular meeting, and 11:00 a.m. three (3) days preceding any special meeting, or adjourned meeting. Amendments of the foregoing shall be presented to the County Legislature not later than 11:00 a.m. on the day of any regular, special, or adjourned meeting. The provisions of the foregoing in reference to filing of petitions, resolutions, local laws, ordinances, amendments thereto, reports of Committees and communications, may be waived by a majority vote of the County Legislature members present and voting. All petitions, resolutions, local law, ordinances and amendments thereto will be provided to the County Attorney, or outside counsel pursuant to the County Charter, for review and

approval as to form and legality. Nothing contained herein shall prohibit the Chairperson of the County Legislature, upon a finding by the Chairperson that a conflict of interest may be present or that it is in the best interest of the County Legislature, from using outside counsel or a specifically designated Legislative Counsel to provide legal assistance, including, but not limited to, the preparation of resolutions, ordinances, legalizing acts and local laws to be presented for action by the County Legislature. Such outside counsel or specifically designated Legislative Counsel may, but are not required to, seek the advice of the County Attorney as to form and legality in the preparation of resolutions, ordinances, legalizing, regulating acts and local laws.

RULE 9. Resolutions and reports of standing or special committees may be tabled by a majority vote at any time before final action is taken.

RULE 10. All resolutions, ordinances and local laws, whether or not previously referred to an appropriate committee, may, when tabled pursuant to Rule 9, be referred to such appropriate Committee without debate, unless waived by a majority of the County Legislature members present and voting. The Committee Chair may request an opinion from the County Attorney, or outside counsel pursuant to the County Charter, on the legality of the proposed legislation prior to consideration by the Committee.

C. MOTIONS.

Res. 12 - 2.1.93 RULE 11. When a question shall be under consideration, no motion shall be received except as herein specified, which motion shall have precedence in the order named, to wit:

- 1. For an adjournment or recess of the County Legislature.
- 2. A call of the County Legislature.
- 3. For the previous question.
- 4. To lay on the table.
- 5. To postpone indefinitely.
- 6. To postpone to a certain day.
- 7. To go into a committee of the whole on pending subject immediately.
- 8. To refer to a committee of the whole.
- 9. To refer to a standing committee.
- 10. To refer to a special committee.
- 11. To amend.

All motions for an adjournment or recess, for the previous question, or to lay on the table, shall neither be amended nor debatable.

No motion shall be made, except a motion to adjourn or recess, and no votes shall be taken except a vote to adjourn or recess, between the hours of midnight and 8:00 a.m.

RULE 12. A motion to rise and report progress shall be in order at any stage, and shall be decided without debate.

Res. 215 - 9.3.91 RULE 13. Any motion, resolution or local law offered by any member may be withdrawn by the member presenting it at any time before it is put to a vote or an amendment to such motion, resolution or local law has been adopted.

A member of the Legislature may object to a motion or resolution being withdrawn or amended by a sponsor with respect to any motion or resolution approved by a standing committee. A member of the Legislature may object to a local law being withdrawn with respect to any local law which has been introduced in accordance with these rules and Section 20 of the Municipal Home Rule Law.

RULE 14. The "previous question" shall be as follows: "Shall the main question now be put" and until it is decided shall preclude all amendments and debate. When the County Legislature shall order the previous questions, and amendments are pending, the question shall first be taken upon such amendments in reverse order, and then upon the main question without further debate or amendment.

RULE 15. No motion for reconsideration shall be in order unless made on the same day, or the meeting day next succeeding that on which the decision proposed to be reconsidered took place. A motion to reconsider must be made by a member who voted with the majority on the decision of the motion or resolution proposed to be reconsidered. When a motion to reconsider has been decided, it shall not again be submitted within the same term of the current Legislature. A twice defeated resolution cannot be reoffered for a period of six months, unless the majority of the members of the proper committee shall recommend the reoffering of said resolution. The committee Chair may request an opinion from the County Attorney, or outside counsel pursuant to the County Charter, on the similarity and legality of the proposed legislation prior to the consideration thereof by the proper committee.

D. CHAIRPERSON

RULE 16. In case the **Chairperson** is to be absent for not more than one (1) day at a time, the **Chairperson** may appoint a member of the County Legislature to be acting **Chairperson**. If the **Chairperson** shall be absent for a longer time, the County Legislature shall elect a temporary **Chairperson**, and if at any time no presiding officer shall be present, the County Legislature may elect a temporary **Chairperson**. The **Chairperson** shall be an ex-officio member of all Committees of the County Legislature, entitled to the same rights and privileges as other members of said committees except the right to vote. The Majority legislature, entitled to the same rights and privileges as other members of said committees except the right to vote when not appointed on the committee. The Majority and Minority Leaders respectively shall be designated by a majority of the members of the Majority and Minority respectively, directed to the Chairperson of the County Legislature in writing.

RULE 17. The Chairperson shall take the chair promptly at the hour specified for the convening of the County Legislature, and shall preserve order and decorum. In debate, the Chairperson shall prevent personal reflections and confine members to the question under discussion. When two or more members arise at the same time, the Chairperson shall recognize the one entitled to the floor. The Chairperson shall decide all questions of order, which decisions shall be final unless an appeal is taken to the County Legislature and sustained.

RULE 18. On every appeal, the Chairperson shall have the right to assign reasons for the Chairperson's decision. In case of such appeal, no member shall speak more than once. The Chairperson shall then put the question: "Shall the ruling of the Chair be sustained?", which question shall be decided by a majority of the members present on the aye and no vote.

RULE 19. In all cases, except appeals from the rulings of the Chair, the Chairperson shall have the right to vote. When the County Legislature shall be equally divided on any questions, including the Chairperson's vote, the question shall be deemed defeated.

RULE 20. While the Chairperson is putting a question, or while the roll is being called, no member shall speak or leave the member's place.

RULE 21. If the resolution, local law or ordinance in debate contains several distinct propositions, the same may be divided by the Chair at the request of any member, to the end that a vote may be taken on each proposition, but a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

RULE 22. All questions relative to priority of business shall be decided by the Chairperson without debate, and the Chairperson's decision shall be final unless reversed by a majority of the members then in attendance.

E. PROCEDURE.

RULE 23. All questions of order and procedure arising in the County Legislature and not governed by the Rules of the County Legislature, Charter or Administrative Code, shall be subject to and interpreted by Roberts Rules of Order, Newly Revised as far as applicable.

Res. 9 - 1.4.10 RULE 24. No member shall speak more than five minutes with a three minute rebuttal period at any one time on the same question, speaking and rebuttal periods each being limited to one on the same question. After a member has exceeded any of the

RULE 25. When any member of the County Legislature shall desire to speak, the member shall arise and obtain recognition from the chair before proceeding.

Res. 22 - 2.5.96 **RULE 26.** Persons, not members of the County Legislature, may, by the consent of the Chairperson, be given the privileges of the floor to speak in regard to matters pending before the County Legislature. In addition to the foregoing, at the commencement of each Session, there shall be a period of up to thirty (30) minutes during which members of the public may address the Legislature on any items on the Session Agenda and on any issues germane to the business of the Legislature as determined by the Chairperson. RULE 27. All resolutions, local laws and ordinances shall be engrossed by the Clerk in the order in which they have been directed by the County Legislature to be engrossed.

RULE 28. A register shall be made by the Clerk of all resolutions, local laws and ordinances introduced in the County Legislature, in which shall be recorded under appropriate heads, the progress of all such resolutions, local laws and ordinances. The Clerk shall also keep a General Index of all ordinances of a permanent nature.

RULE 29. Every local law or ordinance shall be adopted pursuant to the provisions of Article 3, Section 20 of the Municipal Home Rule Law.

F. VOTING.

RULE 30. Oral motions shall be put to vote with a second in regard to resolutions, local laws, ordinances, and amendments, (all other oral motions shall not require a second, and a vote would be taken following the Rules of this County Legislature or Robert's Rules of Order), and written motions on resolutions shall be put to vote without being seconded, and if there be no objection to the motions and resolutions when read, they shall be adopted with a roll call to be taken in one of the following manners decided by the Chairperson: (a) the Clerk shall call the name of each County Legislator present; (b) the Clerk shall call the name of the County Legislator whose surname shall be first alphabetically, then the Majority Leader, the Minority Leader, and the County Legislator whose surname shall be last alphabetically.

- **Res. 131 3.5.79 RULE 30a.** If there is no objection by a member, amendments to local laws, resolutions or ordinances may be accepted by the sponsor without a separate vote on such amendment; otherwise, any amendment shall be separately put to a vote.

 - **RULE 33.** Every member who shall be in the room when a question is stated by the chair, shall vote thereon, unless excused with the consent of at least two-thirds of the members present, or unless if a member be personally interested in the question in which case the member may, upon request, be excused by the **Chairperson** from voting.
 - As the name of each legislator is called, the legislator shall, unless excused from the vote, respond by voting "aye", "yes", or "no" and no other response shall be permitted.

G. RULES OF THE COUNTY LEGISLATURE

RULE 34. The foregoing rules when adopted by a majority vote of the members present and voting shall immediately become the Rules of this County Legislature.

RULE 35. These Rules shall not be altered or amended except by a majority vote of the Legislators present, accompanied by a written or printed copy of the proposed alterations or amendments.

Res. 692 - 12.28.79 **RULE 36.** These rules may at any time during the session be suspended by a majority vote of the members present and voting, provided however, that the member making application for such suspension must state the purpose for which the same is asked.

SECTION 2. COMMITTEES.

Res. 207 - 12.17.19 **RULE 37.** The following Standing Committees, including the committee Chair, Vice Chair and members, shall be appointed by the permanent Chairperson within twenty (20) days after the Chairperson's election, and a list of such Committees shall forthwith be filed with the Clerk of the County Legislature. There shall be five (5) members on the Standing Committees and seven (7) members on the Ways and Means Committee.

Each standing committee of this Legislature shall review only those resolutions, local laws, propositions, or issues which relate to the corresponding administrative units designated hereinabove. In the event that there is a question as to which committee shall properly review a resolution, local law, proposition or issue, the Chairperson of the Legislature shall decide which standing committee is to review the same.

RULE 38. The committees so appointed by the Chairperson shall have general and supervisory charge of all matters pertaining to the operation of the respective departments of the County Government over which they have supervision. It shall be the duty of each member of the Committees to become familiar with the work of departments or agencies of County Government entrusted to each of such committee. Each such Committee by majority vote shall have the power to subpoena witnesses and to investigate in such manner as seems best, the particular department or agency of County Government under its supervision and to that end may, if occasion demand, take sworn statements from any county employees of the County on any matter affecting the proper, economical and lawful operation of the department under investigation.

Res. 162 - 1.1.00 RULE 39. The Chairperson of the County Legislature and all members of each Committee, and the Majority and Minority Leaders of the County Legislature shall receive notice of all meetings and any agenda pertaining hereto, but only the members of the respective committees shall be entitled to vote on any and all propositions before the same.

RULE 39a. The order of business at each meeting of a standing committee of the legislature shall be as follows:

- 1. Reading and approval of the minutes of the proceedings of the previous meeting.
- 2. Presentation of resolutions and local laws.
- 3. Adjournment.

Res. 127 - 4.3.78 **RULE 40.** The Chairperson shall appoint all members of Standing and Special Committees. The Chairperson shall also fill all vacancies in said committees from the membership of the County Legislature. The Chairperson shall decide which standing, special or subcommittee is to review a local law, resolution or proposition where not provided for by these rules.

RULE 41. All members of standing committees of the County Legislature shall continue in office until their successors have been appointed, but nothing herein contained shall be construed to allow any person to continue to serve upon any committee after said member shall have ceased to be a member of said County Legislature. The Chairperson of the County Legislature shall fill any vacancy occurring in any standing committee by appointment as soon as practicable. The Chairperson may at any time on the Chairperson's own motion refer any resolution, when offered, to such committee as the Chairperson deems proper.

Res. 127 - 4.3.78 RULE 42. No report shall be made by any Committee on any subject referred to it in the absence of a majority of said committee unless a majority of the County Legislature so directs by discharge of said Committee or otherwise. Final action shall not be taken by a standing, special or subcommittee of this Legislature on a local law, resolution or proposal, except for referral to another committee, unless said local law, resolution or proposal is presented in written form; a majority of the committee present and voting may in their discretion waive this requirement.

Res. 127 - 4.3.78 **RULE 42a.** Except as provided for in these Rules, these Rules shall not apply to the Committees of this Legislature.

SECTION 3. COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

RULE 43. The County Legislature may, at any time when in Session, by a majority vote of those present, resolve itself into a committee of the whole on any subject before it, and in such case, the Chairperson shall designate some member to preside for such purpose.

RULE 44. The same rules shall be observed in Committee of the Whole as in the County Legislature, so far as the same are applicable, except that the previous question shall not apply nor shall the number of time a member may be limited, except that ayes and nays shall not be taken.

RULE 45. If at any time when the Committee of the Whole it be ascertained that there is no quorum, the Committee Chair shall immediately report the fact to the Chairperson of the County Legislature.

SECTION 4. FISCAL.

RULE 46. Funds shall be established annually by the County Legislature in accordance with the budget as adopted.

RULE 47. The County Legislature pursuant to Sections 607, 608 and 609 of Article VI of the Onondaga County Charter, from time to time may withdraw from or transfer to the several funds such amounts as may be determined by said County Legislature and fixed in the resolutions directing such transfers or withdrawals.

RULE 48. It shall be the duty of every county officer and employee to appear before the Ways and Means Committee upon its request for the purpose of informing the committee of any point relative to the tentative budget submitted by the County Executive for the consideration of the Committees.

RULE 49. Pursuant to Section 2114 of the Code, County officials, heads of administrative units and treasurers of authorized agencies shall make an annual report of the activities of their respective administrative units or authorized agencies during the preceding fiscal year and shall file same with the Clerk of the County Legislature not later than February 1 of each year.

Authorized agencies which have not received financial contribution from the County of Onondaga during the preceding fiscal year shall not be required to file reports pursuant to this Rule.

RULE 50. All requests and applications for salary or wage increases of county employees, when presented to the County Legislature, shall be referred by the Chairperson

to the Ways and Means Committee. The Ways and Means Committee shall not act upon such salary request until such request has been reviewed by the administrative head concerned, the Commissioner of Personnel, the Chief Fiscal Officer and the County Executive.

SECTION 5. ORGANIZATION OF THE COUNTY LEGISLATURE.

Res. 289 - 12.18.95 RULE 51. The Organizational Meeting of the Onondaga County Legislature shall convene within the first day, other than a Saturday, Sunday or a holiday, in the month of January of the calendar year next succeeding the General Election at which the Legislators have been elected to the County Legislature, and shall at that meeting elect a Chairperson and Clerks for the term of office for which the members of the County Legislature were elected. Provided, however, that Organizational Meeting may be convened within the first three days, other than a Saturday, Sunday or holiday, in the month of January when so designated in writing by the Chairperson of the County Legislature. A written notice of the date and time of the organization meeting shall be given to each Legislator by the Clerk of the County Legislature at least four days prior to said meeting. Thereafter, the County Legislature shall operate under the Rules of the previous Legislature until such times as new rules are adopted by the Legislative body.

RULE 52. Procedure for organization meeting: The Clerk of the County Legislature last elected shall act as Chair pro tem. The Chair pro tem shall call the County Legislature to order and call the roll, followed by a pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Whereupon the Chair pro tem shall declare: "The first order of business is the election of the Chairperson". Nominations for the office of Chairperson shall then be taken from the floor and such nominations must be seconded. Before proceeding to an election, the Chair pro tem shall inquire if there are any further nominations. If there is no response, the Chair pro tem shall declare the nominations closed. Voting shall be by full roll call with each legislator, when the legislator's name is called, declaring the name of the candidate of the legislator's choice who has been duly nominated and seconded. Voting shall continue until a candidate receives a majority vote of the whole number of members of the County Legislature; whereupon the Chair pro tem shall declare the duly elected Chairperson. Upon election, the Chairperson shall immediately assume all duties and responsibilities of the office and shall continue to act in such capacity until the termination of office.

The Chairperson shall then preside over the election of the Clerk, Deputy Clerk and Assistant Clerk of the County Legislature subject to the same procedure and vote. Upon election, the Clerks shall immediately assume all duties and responsibilities of the office of the County Legislature.

a. A LOCAL LAW REGARDING VIDEOCONFERENCING BY ONONDAGA COUNTY PUBLIC BODIES PURSUANT TO NEW YORK STATE OPEN MEETINGS LAW (Sponsored by Mr. Rowley)

LOCAL LAW NO. ____ - 2022

A LOCAL LAW REGARDING VIDEOCONFERENCING BY ONONDAGA COUNTY PUBLIC BODIES PURSUANT TO NEW YORK STATE OPEN MEETINGS LAW

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF ONONDAGA, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Findings and Authorization. The New York State Open Meetings Law has been amended to authorize the expanded use of videoconferencing by public bodies to conduct meetings, under extraordinary circumstances, using remote access technology consistent with state law. A public hearing having been held, this Onondaga Legislature hereby authorizes all public bodies of the County of Onondaga, including the Onondaga County Legislature, its standing committee, special committee, subcommittee, organizational, regular session, and special session meetings, and County offices, agencies, departments and other units of County government, ("Onondaga County public body(ies)") the use of videoconferencing to conduct their meetings pursuant to the requirements of New York State Public Officers Law Section 103-a, also referred to herein as New York State Open Meetings Law.

Section 2. Quorum Requirements. The use of videoconferencing to conduct meetings of Onondaga County public bodies is authorized only where a minimum number of members are present to fulfill any applicable quorum requirement in the same physical location or locations where the public can attend.

Section 3. Procedures. The procedures governing member and public attendance shall be as provided for within this local law and New York State Public Officers Law Section 103-a. This local law, including such procedures, shall be conspicuously posted on the official website of this Onondaga County Legislature.

Members shall be physically present at any such meeting unless such member is unable to be physically present at any such meeting location due to extraordinary circumstances, as set forth in this local law. "Extraordinary Circumstances" shall include disability, illness, caregiving responsibilities, or any other significant or unexpected factor or event which precludes the member's physical attendance at such meeting. "Extraordinary Circumstances" shall not include travel, for business or otherwise, unless such travel is due to disability, illness, caregiving responsibilities or similar significant or unexpected factor or event which precludes the member's physical attendance at such meeting. The chairperson or leadership of any Onondaga County public body shall retain discretion over permitted extraordinary circumstances for such public body. Members shall provide notice of their inability to be physically present at a meeting to the chairperson or leadership of the Onondaga County public body at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to the meeting or as soon as reasonably able.

Except in the case of executive sessions conducted pursuant to New York State Public Officers Law Section 105, all Onondaga County public bodies shall ensure that their members can be heard, seen and identified, while a meeting is being conducted, including but not limited to any motions, proposals, resolutions, and any other matter formally discussed or voted upon. The minutes of meetings involving videoconferencing shall include which, if any, members participated remotely and shall be available to the public pursuant to New York State Public Officers Law Section 106.

Where videoconferencing is used to conduct a meeting, the public notice for the meeting shall inform the public that videoconferencing will be used, where the public can view and/or participate in such meeting, where required documents and records will be posted or available, and identify the physical location for the meeting where the public can attend. Each meeting conducted using videoconferencing

shall be recorded and such recordings posted or linked on the official public website of the Onondaga County public body within five (5) business days following the meeting, and shall remain so available for a minimum of five (5) years thereafter. Such recordings shall be transcribed upon request. Where videoconferencing is used to conduct a meeting, members of the public shall have the opportunity to view such meeting via video, and to participate in proceedings via videoconference in real time where public comment or participation is authorized, and videoconferencing shall ensure the same public participation or testimony as in-person participation or testimony.

As provided for within Open Meetings Law Section 103-a, the in-person participation requirements for members set forth in this local law shall not apply during a state disaster emergency declared by the governor or a local state of emergency proclaimed by the Onondaga County Executive where circumstances necessitating the emergency declaration would affect or impair the ability of an Onondaga County public body to hold an in-person meeting.

Open meetings that are broadcast or that use videoconferencing shall utilize technology to permit access by members of the public with disabilities consistent with the 1990 Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), as amended, and corresponding guidelines. For the purposes of this section, "disability" shall have the meaning defined in New York State Executive Law Section 292.

Section 4. Effective Date and Expiration Date. As provided for within state law, this local law shall expire July 1, 2024. Provided, however, if state law is amended to extend the expiration date beyond July 1, 2024, then this local law is likewise similarly extended without further action of this Onondaga County Legislature. This local law shall be filed and take effect in accordance with provisions of the Municipal Home Rule Law.
